The Power of Water

Water Power Day Returns to Peirce Mill on Saturday, July 12

with a wide range of skills and backgrounds—no milling experience required!



Funding a Full-Time Miller

The Friends of Peirce Mill work closely with our partners in the National Park Service to maintain and operate the mill's wooden machinery. In March, we trained a new team of rangers and volunteers to run the mill.

But the mill is a complex machine that requires constant maintenance. In the long run, Peirce Mill needs a full-time miller. But the miller wouldn't just care for the building and its machinery. Hiring a miller would enable us to offer even more school and public programming at Peirce Mill.

With that goal in mind, the Friends recently used a capacity-building grant from the National Park Foundation to



develop plans to fund a miller position at Peirce Mill. Working with consultants from the Potrero Group, we researched NPS policies and discussed possible funding strategies with park leadership. We also interviewed folks from other mills and historic sites — and learned how they fund operations.

Bringing Back the Tea House

In March, the Friends of Peirce Mill and Rock Creek Park celebrated Women's History Month by re-creating the Peirce Mill Tea House. From about 1905 to 1934, the old stone building beside Rock Creek was used as a tea house. Back then, tea houses and tea rooms were fashionable gathering places, especially for women. They also provided business opportunities for women at a time of limited career options.

The Peirce Mill Tea House Celebration on March 29 told the stories of the female entrepreneurs who managed the tea house in the early 20th century. The Friends produced a fun, educational booklet for young visitors, and played a short film about Hattie Sewell, a Black woman who lost a contract to operate the Peirce Mill Tea House after a prominent neighbor's racist complaints.









Preserving Rock Creek Park's Botanical History

Earlier this year, Friends of Peirce Mill Board Member and Orchardist Tim Makepeace and Rock Creek Park Botanist Ana Chuquin harvested new growths—or scions—from a very old pear tree in Rock Creek Park. This pear tree is a surviving reminder of the orchards that once flourished near Peirce Mill. Tim grafted the scions onto root stock, and we're hoping to keep part of this unusual pear tree growing.
